

Dear Friends.

For me, today's luncheon is one of the best events on our calendar. The name says it all: We honor our Lewyt legacy by recognizing the humane contributions of some of our most dedicated supporters. I extend my sincere congratulations to all of our fantastic honorees: Dorothy Graham, the New York Mets, and Joey.

Help Us Find Them Homes. What a powerful theme for this celebration, and what a perfect connection to our ongoing fundraising for Bianca's Furry Friends. When this fabulous facility is completed, we'll be able to help even more animals find homes — and you'll have made it possible.

With that in mind, I want to tell you about two Mutt-i-grees® and their journeys home. Max, a tuxedo kitten, came to us in 2005, just six months old. We adopted him to a family that eagerly wanted him. Eight years later, however, they moved, and poor Max didn't fit into their plan. They left him at a municipal shelter in the fall of 2013, which is when we brought him back to our campus.

Suddenly homeless, Max didn't like cages or cats. After all, he'd always been king of his domain. Our administrative offices weren't home, but they were the next-best thing. So for several months, Max spent a lot of time distracting me from work by sprawling across the piles of papers on my desk. Then, this spring, a friend of one of our adopters — a woman who wanted a big, older, mellow cat — fell in love and took Max home...this time, for good!

And now there's Thurman, a sweet dog who came to us in 2006 from Tennessee, just nine weeks old. A family quickly adopted him, but eight years later, back he came: a child had developed allergies.

Thurman is currently our office foster, waiting for some of Max's good luck to rub off. He loves people and will nudge for more pets. But as an older animal, he's a challenge to place. Still, he's safe with us until the right person comes along, someone who'll give him his truly permanent home.

Thank you for enabling us to care for animals like Max and Thurman. Your tremendous support gives us the time and resources we need to help these special seniors find their loving homes.


A Message Sandra Atlas Bass Luncheon Chair

a forever home!





### Bianca's Furry Friends Feline Adoption & Wellness Center

For more than 70 years, North Shore Animal League America has been the undisputed leader in the no-kill movement. Our goals and ideals have informed every program we've introduced, demonstrating our commitment to compassion and excellence while creating a model for other organizations to follow.

Consider just a few of our multi-faceted efforts: our nationwide Mobile Adoption Programs; our much-imitated National Humane Relocation Program; our worldwide Adoptathon; our groundbreaking Mutt-i-grees® Curriculum; and our compassionate Seniors for Seniors Program. These and other outstanding programs have enabled us to save more than 1,000,000 dogs, cats, puppies, and kittens — and enrich the lives of millions of happy adopters.

And now, thanks to your loyal support, we're about to introduce yet another lifesaving innovation: Bianca's Furry Friends Feline Adoption & Wellness Center, or BFF as we affectionately call it. This 14,000-square-foot facility will give our felines a comfortable, cage-free environment with all the amenities, including a surgical suite, exam rooms, a feline behavior department, grooming facilities, a 24-hour nursery, and a kitten adoption area.



Although we continue to raise funds for this \$7 million project, we're also making tremendous progress. We've completed many required feasibility studies and, following an exhaustive search, selected as our architects the prestigious Bacon Group, Inc., which boasts 20 years of experience designing outstanding animal care facilities across the country.

Because this facility requires a second-floor addition to our current adoption center, construction will be conducted in phases. All animals will be relocated to other areas of the campus for their safety and to allow adoptions to continue uninterrupted. This is a complex undertaking, but we're fully committed to continuing our fundraising so this facility can provide the best possible care for our felines — and become a model for shelters around the world.

We thank all of our donors, especially you, whose presence today will greatly further this project. And of course we thank our indomitable spokesperson, Beth Stern, who with her husband, Howard, has worked tirelessly to make this facility a reality.

By expanding our no-kill promise, BFF will help Animal League America continue as the premiere rescue and adoption organization in the world.

Brian has remained closely tied to current events and pop culture, thanks to the launch of his website PopGoesTheWeek.com. His mix of quirky humor and journalism has made him a frequent guest and expert on entertainment news, viral trends, and celebrity buzz on many national television programs, including "Today," CNN's "New Day," and MSNBC's "Politics Nation with Al Sharpton." He's heard regularly as an entertainment contributor on SiriusXM and Cumulus Radio, and has been interviewed and quoted in many prominent publications.

After a stint at AOL, where he served as vice president of programming and executive producer of digital content production, Brian joined ABC's daytime talk show "The View," where he was coexecutive producer, working alongside Whoopi Goldberg, Rosie O'Donnell, Rosie Perez, Nicolle Wallace, and others.

Scott is an original member of Laughing Liberally, and has been the resident comedian on MSNBC's live coverage of the White House Correspondents' Dinner. Scott is well known for his unique brand of Jewish comedy, which he performs regularly at the 92nd Street Y, in Manhattan, and at the legendary New York Friars Club, where he is a member.

He also headlined "Radical Menshes and Maniacs, New Jewish Humor and Music," at La Mama Theater in Manhattan. And working with Palestinian-American comedian Dean Obeidallah, Scott co-created "Standup for Peace: The Two Comedian Solution to the Middle East." They perform at colleges, theaters, Temples, and Jewish and Arab community centers across the country.





### Sandra Atlas Bass Philanthropist Award

## Dorothy Graham





A Long Island native, Dorothy has spent her professional life as an administrator in both the nonprofit and public sectors, providing services for low-income and indigent communities in California. Yet her ties to Long Island endured, and when it came time to honor her parents, Victor and Olga, and their lifelong compassion for animals, she turned to Animal League America, where she found a perfect match for her no-kill philosophy.

Not surprisingly, Dorothy focused her attention on felines, donating several cat-condos, supporting our Cat Sanctuary, and, in her mother's name, funding a feline exam room in the Special Recovery Center. But the project closest to her heart is our Seniors for Seniors Program, which she supports through the Olga Graham Fund.

"The human-animal bond is always critical," she says, "but perhaps never more so than as we age. For widowed seniors or those living apart from their children, animal companions are wonderful antidotes to isolation. But most important is the mutual love seniors share with their pets. By encouraging adoption of senior pets and by helping with veterinary care and other expenses, we can nurture this bond and help seniors and their pets flourish in a relationship that's beneficial to both parties."

When it comes to the pleasures of feline companionship, Dorothy is an expert. Pepsi, for example, who died in 2012, came to her as a semi-feral kitten who never became fully domesticated. "He wouldn't allow you

to pick him up," she remembers, "but he'd snuggle when he wanted to and purr loudly. He was a great comfort in moments of sadness, such as when my mother died in 2005. I could talk to him about anything, and he'd look at me with deep yellow eyes of wisdom. He was truly my best friend."

We thank Dorothy for sharing her profound love for felines — and all animals — with Animal League America, and for being our kind and generous friend.
